By 2009:

- Strengthen national capacity for tobacco control to enable implementation
 of comprehensive tobacco control strategies in an effective and sustainable
 manner in at least 80% (29) of WPR Member States and areas
- 3. Develop and formally adopt measures to ensure sustainability of tobacco control programmes in all WPR Member States and areas
- 4. Establish Regional, subregional and national mechanisms to address transnational tobacco control issues
- Enhance surveillance, research, information dissemination and advocacy across the Region
